W UNITY:


"How good and pleasant it is when God's people live together in unity!" – Psalm 133:1

Governors' Meeting Update

Last week, our Governors' School Development Committee met to review key areas of school life. Alongside routine procedural items, we looked closely at last year's end-of-year data and discussed our School Improvement Plan for the year ahead. Governors also approved our Pupil Premium Strategy, which is now available on the school website.

We confirmed our ongoing membership of the All Saints' Partnership, ensuring continued collaboration and support across local schools. In addition, I delivered training on our new Howard's Hub, which will also be shared with staff so that we can make the very best use of this exciting new provision for our children.

Outdoor Art and Scientific Enquiry

Year 2 had a wonderful time creating art outdoors, inspired by Alice Fox and Rosie James, using natural objects to make their own designs. They also became mini scientists, investigating how different materials change shape by bending, stretching, squashing and twisting—and making fantastic predictions along the way.

Exploring Charcoal

Year 3 have been developing their art skills using charcoal. They experimented with shading, smudging and blending to create different effects, learning how artists can use tone and texture to bring drawings to life. (And they didn't mind getting a bit dusty along the way!)

Celebrating Diversity

In reading, Year 6 explored our global citizenship theme of diversity. After learning about different disabilities, they created thoughtful posters on how schools can be more inclusive, celebrating the importance of kindness, fairness and respect.

Maths and Science Superstars

Year 1 have been working hard in Maths, learning to compare numbers using greater than, less than, and equal to symbols. In Science, they explored their senses—finding out what they could see, hear, touch, and smell through practical activities.

Colour Detectives

Nursery children enjoyed a colour hunt around the classroom, finding objects and sorting them into the correct colour jars.

What Makes Me, Me?

Reception explored the story What Makes Me a Me? and thought carefully about what makes them special and unique. They looked closely in mirrors before drawing detailed self-portraits. They also continued their work on sorting, thinking of their own criteria such as colour and size.

Imagining Journeys

Year 4 have been planning their independent writing based on Aaron Becker's *Journey*. Using their inference and prediction skills, they considered what might happen next in the story. Their ideas are setting the stage for some exciting writing ahead!













Dinner Debate

Linked to our Christian value of Unity and our focus on spiritual development (Self, Others, World & Beauty, and Beyond)

How can we help bring people together?

This question helps children think about what it means to build unity—finding ways to work, play, and live peacefully with others. It connects to Self and Others by encouraging children to reflect on how their choices can restore friendships, create harmony, and make everyone feel they belong. It also links to World & Beauty and Beyond, as living in unity helps us care for the world together and reflect God's joy when people live side by side in peace.

You might want to share a time when you helped bring people together after a disagreement, or when someone included you and made you feel part of the group.
